CITE MENTOR and ADVISER Formation Program

Rationale

The aim of personal formation is to facilitate the growth of the students in human and supernatural virtues, to progress in their life of piety in order to become responsible citizens and good Christians. Specifically in CITE it means that the students should have a high sense of professionalism and a deep Christian and social-oriented spirit (Profile of a CITE Graduate).

In keeping with the foundational objectives of the school, this attention and formation is personalized. The Personal Formation Mentor then is the person assigned in the school for each student so that they maybe formed as a good Christian in a personal way. For the mentor to be able to do this he needs to be formed so that he can form the students.

1. Objectives

- 1. To prepare the mentors to facilitate the personal formation of the mentees/students, it is essential that the mentor:
 - 1.1 has a deep knowledge of the human person and his relations God, family and Society
 - 1.2 has grasped the fundamentals of moral theology which includes conscience, human freedom, theological and cardinal virtues
 - 1.3 has understood the Mission of CITE
 - 1.4 has training of tutorial skills and knowledge of developmental psychology
 - 1.5 has knowledge of the most effective method in educating the students in human and moral virtues
 - 1.6 knows the unity of knowledge and foundation of the transcendental truths; that is, he can discern the truth, what is good, and what is beautiful so that he is capable in guiding his tutees well.
 - 1.7 lives well unity of life

Class Advisers are very crucial in the school setting. As the Tutor personalizes the formation that is received by the students in the school the class adviser takes care of the collective means of formation for the students as a group. As such they deal with a lot of activities that has to do with students of their class level and with the parents.

- 2. to plan out concrete strategies how the virtues could be lived best by the respective class levels
- 3. to coordinate with the office of the chaplaincy for the spiritual needs of the students
- 4. to offer group counseling and support
- 5. to be aware of one's need to be formed on certain aspects of the spirit of the school
- 6. to be able to plan out the activities for his advisory class
