- Total Population= 170 million (6th most populous country)
- Half of population below age of 18
- UNDP Human Development Index= 144/178 with 40 m people below poverty line
- Agrarian Economic base
- Rural-Urban Dichotomy
- Literacy rate= 53%
 - Male= 65%
 - Female= 40%

- System wide leakages

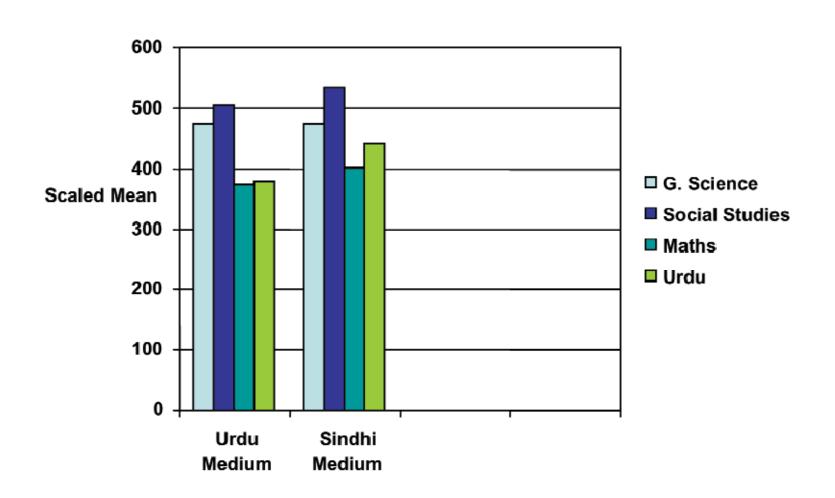
Bringing Language in the Context

- National Language= Urdu
- Official Language of communication= English
- 4 Main Provinces with 6 major Languages
 - Punjabi (44% population)
 - Pushto (15%)
 - Sindhi (14%)
 - Balochi (8%)
 - Seriki (10%)
 - Urdu (8%)

With dialects, accents & social connotations the total number is 69

- Mother tongue debate an old one in Pakistan
- The Quality Angle: Perceptions & Expectations from English Language Teaching in Pakistan
- Intellectual Colonialism: Language of social prestige
- Private sector: The provider of Quality education
 - Loss of confidence in Government schools
 - Parental Demand for better education
 - 1 out of 4 primary student attends private school
- ELT: A barrier for children to learn faster & better
- Direct implications for enrolment, retention & transition to higher levels
- Sindh= An example of inclusive quality education

Challenges for Pakistan
